
So, what defines the Huckins Spirit?

What's New in 2019

The are looking forward to our 93rd summer and excited to share some of the new projects and program additions that you will see when you visit camp this summer.

In the Dining Hall, the kitchen is being remodeled. There will be a newly refurbished floor, new ceiling lights and tiles and a new ceiling hood over our stoves. These upgrades are going to make everything safer and make the kitchen brighter and cleaner. Thanks to Joel, Mike P. and Mike S. who have been doing lots of the work this winter. Additionally, when the snow melts, we will be adding some landscaping in the front of the Dining Hall. You may not recognize the place!

On the Small Crafts Beach, we can't wait to jump into our pontoon boats with their new floors and seats. We have added two sunfish and more paddle boards to the fleet. Fun Fact: If all of our sailboats, paddle boards, kayaks and canoes are in use at the same time we are now able to have 100 campers and 12 staff on the water at the same time. The existing two pontoon boats add 24 more camper seats and 4 more staff seats, bringing our "on the water" capacity to 138! Lastly, we are replacing one of our water ski boats and will have a 2019 Correct Craft Ski Nautique waiting at the boat dock for our water skiers.

On the Sports Field, NH's Highlands Mountain Bike Park staff will be back again this spring to add another mile to our bike trail. The new trail will be connected to our Lollipop

Loop trail so campers will be able to go for a one or two mile bike ride.

Our Program Lodge will be getting a facelift this spring. We are replacing the older windows with new strong Plexiglas. The Lodge will be brighter when we close the windows when it is cooler in the fall. We are also adding new exit doors on the west side (on the Dining Hall side) with a small porch and stairs to give us an additional egress.

There is a new element on the Junior Division playground this year. It is a seventeen-foot net climber. We are sure that this addition will be very popular at summer camp and with our Family Campers.

Lastly, thanks to the generosity of the Robert and Dorothy Goldberg Charitable Foundation and a generous donor, we are adding two water bottle refill stations (one in the Dining Hall and one at the Sports Field). We continue to look at ways to put the green in our green and white! So campers, do not forget your water bottles!

Our season starts with our Community Spaghetti Supper and Alumni Weekend on May 31st-June 2nd. The following weekend is our Mother/Son Weekend, which will be our largest yet with over 110 Moms and Sons registered. We are so fortunate to have alumni, volunteers and international staff who arrive early to help with our busy early season events.

We are counting the days until Opening Day and hope to see you on the shores of Lake Ossipee this summer.



I can still hear his rendition of "On Top of Old Smoky" accompanied by the entire camp. And the "Circus Song" and the "Orchestra Song," all conducted by Duke, left us all breathless and laughing at the same time. Maybe it was his humor and his

ability to laugh at himself as well as the rest of us ... with laughter and kindness mixed together. And maybe, it's because he brought out the best in all of his staff with a smile, a kind word and faith in all of us.

So fortunate am I to have known this renaissance man. This man who returned to camp and directed the two Huckins Songs CDs, which brought back "all those happy memories" to so many of us and Huckins music into all of our hearts.

Duke said, in the 1963 Huckonian, when describing his summer as Camp Director, "For me, it has been one of the most memorable experiences of my life.... because...we had confidence in the loyalty and ability of the staff and in that wonderful, intangible something called the Huckins Spirit."

And so, on behalf of the hundreds of campers and staff who loved Duke, his memory will live long in all of our hearts. Camp was very blessed to have

Making tomorrow's leaders

The Leadership Division

re leaders BORN or MADE?" This is one of the first questions Jody and Kara ask the "W" campers upon their arrival at camp. MADE, of course! Camp Huckins believes each girl has the potential to lead and will develop her own leadership style given the right opportunity, environment and mentors.

Although camp has had a Counselor-In-Training or "CIT" program since 1960, it was not until 1992 when the "W's and CITs" had a Division Leader forming the "Leadership Division." Finally, in 2012, the Division Leader, W's and CITs had a spot to call their own amongst the pines with brand new cabins surrounding a beautiful pavilion. The "Pav" quickly became a popular spot to enjoy fires, sing songs, and a catalyst for important discussions. Because of the shared space, friendships naturally form among the 9th and 10th graders and created a safe space for important discussions around self-esteem, bullying, and diversity.

Camp Huckins takes pride in its history and its many traditions that hold true today—bugle calls, rest hour, singing on tables, dress-up days, hucksters and candlelight, to name a few. While traditions are powerful and meaningful and will be remembered for a lifetime, we realize the importance of adapting and changing with the world around us. Over the last decade, the leadership program has evolved, but the goal remains; provide each girl with an opportunity to grow in leadership and responsibility—qualities that will help her succeed not only at Camp Huckins, but at home, school and in the community.

We continue to strengthen the program by making positive changes. To become a CIT, girls must apply after their W summer by completing an application including references and answering a few questions by a deadline—putting the responsibility on the camper. The CITS receive a CIT

Manual by email before the summer with helpful information to better prepare them for the upcoming summer. Girls are staying more connected in the off-season (and not just with social media!). Last year, Kara created a periodic e-newsletter, The LeadHERship, for W's and CITs to stay connected to camp in the off-season. It contains upcoming events, photos of camper reunions and an educational piece. In the fall, Kara leads a weekend program at camp called LTI (Leadership Training Institute) to continue to develop the participant's skills. Also in the fall, camp hosts a Leadership Division reunion in Massachusetts for all leadership campers from the previous summer. Many girls are also finding other leadership opportunities outside of camp, including the Harvard Young Women's Business Leadership Conference.

High schools now require students to complete Community Service hours to graduate. Camp recognizes the importance Community Service and incorporates projects into the program. Service opportunities range from helping with camp operations, to mentoring younger campers during activities, to projects such building divisional gaga pits, painting picnic benches or running the "Imagination Station" for Thomas the Train.

Camp is proud of the leadership Division and the way it continues to meet the needs of campers. In a world full of technology and instant gratification we take pride in our tech-free slice of heaven. In fact, there was hardly any thought of "estate planning" as a new college graduate trying to figure out the paperwork for her first noncamp job.

My first professional job after college, in advertising, offered a 401k benefit and I was quickly bombarded with the messaging of "start saving early." I maximized the matching contribution from my company by setting aside a portion of my income, hoping that this benefit helped outweigh the paltry salary and my decision to choose a position that offered potential over profits.

I started filling out the registration forms and had a bit of a panic. Here I was, feeling self-assured that I was making sound financial decisions, and yet I felt a bit lonely about listing beneficiaries in case of, you know, the plan has to pay out (if I were, to—you know—die).

Now this was over 19 years ago, but I still remember asking my company's Human Resource department if I could name a beneficiary other than a person. It was a lightbulb moment; there is nowhere else on earth I would rather contribute to than the happiness of a future camper at Huckins.

Now I am married and have a family of my own. I have two young girls who have already stayed in a Huckins cabin and fell in love with camp. I went from having no beneficiaries to having a few—along with plenty of responsibilities. I've never given much thought as to why I decided to become a Legacy Society Member since it was, as they say, a "no brainer."

The why of the Legacy Society feels trite: I'm not able to articulate all the reasons I love Huckins any better than the next girl. I think my photo from the 2017 Tri-ath-Loon reflects



What ever happened to...

Lois Kessin



Four days after her second knee replacement, Lois headed to the polls to cast her vote.

I attended Camp Huckins from 1957 to 1965. Camp was the place where I could forget the restrictions placed on girls - I could be smart, innovative and athletic without comment. I think that I may have driven the staff crazy, but they always allowed me to be me!

After Huckins I went to NYU then moved to Cambridge, MA. Two years ago I moved back to NH to my hometown of Laconia.

In my twenties (and until I moved), I was very involved with groups that tried to make Cambridge a better place to live. I realized that organized sports for women were almost non-existent. Over the years, I organized a competitive women's volleyball team which was recognized throughout New England.

When I wanted to play soccer, I looked around and found again that there were no opportunities for women. In 1978, I joined a small group of women to start the EMWSL (Eastern Mass Women's Soccer League) an organization that still exists today and has grown to include 70 teams from throughout Eastern Massachusetts. I stayed involved with EMWSL (and still played) until I retired in 2017. Hopefully, some Huckins women are currently playing in this league.

For 20 years, I was a high school soccer and softball coach in the Boston area. In 2003, I was inducted into the Mass Soccer Hall of Fame and in 2007 to the New England Soccer Hall of Fame in recognition of my contributions as a player, coach and organizer.

My greatest personal achievement was the establishments of the first girls' soccer team in Dorchester in 1994. The program still exists today with over 100 girls playing. Stories from this program and others were highlighted in *Kicking Grass, Taking Games: Women fight for their right to play the beautiful game* by Maddie Davidson.

Since I moved to Laconia, I have gotten involved with local organizations and hope to do more as I settle into retirement. One of my current projects is the Huckins library.

arenting young children can be isolating - particularly in an occasionally unforgiving climate like ours. When we relocated to North Conway with no nearby family or friends, Squeaky Sneakers was a lifeline. It was one of the first communities we belonged to after moving to the Valley, and I could not have hoped for a warmer or more welcoming introduction, thanks to your cheerful disposition and tireless dedication. (Only you, Kara, could seem happy singing "The Wheels on the Bus" for the 50th time because a child requested it.) But Squeaky Sneakers isn't just a fun thing to do; it is a nurturing space in which kids learn and practice critical life skills: how to wait their turn for the slide, point out colors underneath a parachute, and politely request more juice. Later, both of my children learned the foundations for water safety and swimming in the safe, encouraging environment of Squeaky Swimmers. Joanna, parent

hen I joined Youth and Government my freshman year of high school, I had no idea that it would one day change my life. I parted with the program after one year to pursue other government clubs and initiatives because of the thrill that I found when advocating for something that I believed in. However, it was not long before Youth and Government found me again, this time in my junior year. I was given the opportunity to apply for a program in Washington D.C. in which I could lobby on behalf of the YMCA in Congress.
