2022 at Huckins Camp

saw a return to our new normal. We welcomed back hikes, horseback riding, dance and drama, international staff, and cart people. There was lots of singing, friendships made, friendships strengthened, tight races in cabin inspections, "wicked good" talent shows, and friendly competition on College and Olympic Days. Camp days were filled with opportunities for campers and staff to stretch, practice, and learn as they discovered more about who they want to be and all they are capable of.

We also saw a return to normal for our alumni, family and community building programs. We welcomed back Family Campers, Labor Day Family Campers, Mother Son, Mother

Daughter, and Women's Wellness programs. Watching parents, grandparents, future Huckins campers, siblings, cousins, aunts and uncles making memories together, here under the pines, filled my heart with joy.

In September we welcomed back Carroll County students who began their school year team building on the Huckins ropes course. In total, we served over 600 local students, introducing them to Huckins' core values as they learned more about their classmates and how to work together.

The strength of CCYMCA Camp Huckins is grounded in the generosity and commitment of all parts of this interconnected Huckins family.

Summer 2022 also brought some new things to Huckins. The Sports Complex renovations were completed, making it a popular destination with new

lighting, windows, fans, new basketball hoop, and opened walls for airflow. The mezzanine created a space for staff to hang out and work out. One of the biggest changes was the new "Megafield" created to connect the Sports Complex to the tennis courts. By removing trees, moving some of the ropes course elements, and planting grass, we doubled the size of the sports field. The Dining Hall saw some changes, too. A grassy yard was created out front for campers and



staff to enjoy, and we started to prepare for an addition where the Middler Division tent was set up.

During staff training, we did an activity that compared the Huckins community to an ecosystem. With yarn, we created webs that connected staff to one another and looked at how the actions of one member of the web impacted others. The activity inspired conversation about how to support one another and what we could do to care for our Huckins camp community. It was a theme we returned to throughout the summer to support one another through the challenges and opportunities that emerged. Staff demonstrated remarkable care, resiliency, flexibility, and creativity to make every day special!

As I reflect on the summer and fall, I recognize that the "ecosystem" of our summer camp community is part of a much larger Huckins network. The strength of CCYMCA Camp Huckins is grounded in the generosity and commitment of all parts of this interconnected Huckins family. We could not deliver the Huckins Experience without the dedicated staff and volunteers, families, campers, alumni, and donors. Each member of this community is essential in helping to create, prepare for, care for, and deliver programs that bring the Huckins spirit to life.

Volunteers shared their expertise and time to make camps happen. Our Medical Advisory Committee helped staff develop guidelines for a safe and healthy summer and responded quickly when we had questions during camp.

After 2 years, we were finally able to celebrate Jody Skelton's 51 years of service, and alumni volunteers led in the planning and delivery of this special day. We would not have been able to run such successful Family Camps or Mother/Daughter/Son weekends without our experienced team of program volunteers stepping in to help run departments. When we put a call out for donations of yarn, magazines, and mugs, this community made sure we had the supplies we needed.

We are grateful for each of you that shared your time, expertise, and resources. Connections & Green Spaces

he Dining Hall grounds have a fresh look thanks to the skills of the Huckins Facilities team. Under the leadership of Mike Pfluger and Jeremy Fullerton, we have some new green spaces at Camp! In the fall of 2020, a new covered entry canopy was added to the Dining Hall to help make the building more accessible and to provide a facelift to the entrance way. This was then followed by a much larger landscaping improvement in the Fall 2021. The field in front of the Dining Hall was leveled and the team then seeded the area with the hope mother nature would provide a constant supply of rain to transform the space. The result did not disappoint! The space was completed with two plant beds, located on either side of the doorway, along with a stone fire pit. The team planted a variety of plants in the gardens,

including giant sunflowers that shone down on campers and staff all summer long. Our pre and post season groups especially loved to gather around the Dining Hall campfire on chilly mornings to enjoy a cup of hot coffee or cocoa and great conversation. The area has become a hub for morning and evening gatherings for many in our community.

The Sportsfield and Sports Complex have also benefited from thoughtful landscaping improvements this year. The 2017 Master Plan called for the trees between the field and complex to be removed to generate added playing field space and to connect the Sportsfield with the Sports Complex. After the clearing, the team reclaimed

and supplemented the existing soil and seeded the area, effectively doubling the size of the playing area and connecting the field with the Sports Complex. This has resulted in more space for games and has improved the visibility and accessibility to the Sports Complex and Archery range. The final phase of this project will commence in Spring 2023 as pavers will be placed under the pergola, flower beds will be added, shrubs will be planted, and other final landscaping is completed.

The improvements are incredible and have been remarked upon by all who frequented the Dining Hall and Sportsfield this summer. These beautiful gathering spaces enhance opportunities for connection within our community.

Thoughts from the Kitchen

he wild intensity of a summer in the Huckins kitchen so quickly segues to the cool and quiet that it almost makes it seem unreal. Could all of that really just have happened?! In the blink of an eye, it is over, and I am left with a feeling of swaying in the wake of the tornado that just passed.

Mid-summer there is barely time to think as meal after meal come and go in their all-consuming way. Most thoughts and feelings about what works, and what doesn't, are kept at bay. Scribbled notes of equipment needed, menu ideas, recipe changes and other random thoughts litter my desk, office, and brain in the hopes that they will still be there in October when I pick up the pieces. I recall texting my wife, Smackie, at the beginning of first session, 2013, "Well, see you at the end of 4th session..." It was my first summer and it had just dawned on me the magnitude of making good food happen on this scale.

And so it goes every year. October is the first chance I get to be pensive and contemplate the food program at Huckins. It's the time I get to think about the wins and losses of the summer. Aside from the more mundane minutia of inventories, equipment lists, budgets, and corner dustings, two things stand out from Summer of 2022.

First was the marking of my 10th summer here. It was an occasion to walk barefoot through the pine needles, hold a candle, and join twenty or so campers and staff celebrating their milestone years and truly feel part of something much bigger than me or a job. An occasion to immerse myself in this community, outside of the dining hall walls, for just a few minutes and hear evidence of the magic of Camp Huckins and take an oath to uphold this magic.

Second, was the jubilant return of a full international staff to Huckins. After two summers with only a handful of international staffers, we were so grateful to welcome 25 people from all over the world. The richness and texture that our community gains from this influx of cultures and languages and personalities is incredible. The energy and fun that it brings to the kitchen is unmatched. I had not realized how much I missed this element of my Camp experience until it returned.

This summer in the kitchen we had folks from Colombia, Mexico, Poland, Turkey, Hungary, and the US. This cultural exchange is, I think, just as beneficial for Camp as it is for the participants. I get to experience Turkish coffee and Polish breakfasts while sharing recipes for many Huckins meals. I get to watch tentative first timers make fast friends and smile through the messiest of clean-ups, talk after-camp travel plans, and see the joy that New Hampshire's lakes, mountains, and coast bring. I get to be present for someone's first encounter with a live lobster and see the mingling of wonder and fear at the thought of eating it! Most importantly, we all get to experience the connectedness of us as people and see how alike we all

are whether we live in Europe, Western Asia, North America, or South America.

A few words from some of this year's kitchen crew probably echo the experience of many campers and staff alike, no matter where they are from:

"My time at Camp Huckins was incredible, I met people who made my experience and my time in the kitchen wonderful. For me, as an

I feel very grateful for this rewarding opportunity! " – Wolf, Colombia

"Coming to work on a camp in the States has been my goal for quite a few years. But I believe it's Camp Huckins specifically that made it a life changing experience. Upon arrival, as many of my international friends that I met this summer, I had many fears related to finding my place in a completely new environment. Turns out, they were not accurate at all. Meeting so many wonderful people, out of whom many became really close friends that I still speak to every day, even after the summer has ended, feels quite surreal. I guess what made it happen is a unique Huckins atmosphere, where, despite many challenges, everyone could feel they're part of this one big, family-like community. Even when being an 'outsider,' after surprisingly short time it felt like I'm welcomed and accepted there. And these aren't only my words!

It's been two months since leaving camp, and I already miss everything about it (seriously, looking back in time even endless sinks of bowls to wash seems so fun!). Chef Joel's Pumpkin Cake with a Maple Cream Cheese Frosting – A Huckins Holiday Dessert

This recipe is pretty simple as far as cakes go, but it is also seasonal and super delicious. I worked this out in one of my first summers but in recent years it has been only popping up in the post season as the weekends start to get cooler. I'm always surprised at how the pumpkin leads to a perfectly moist cake. Give it a try this holiday season and let us know how you like it.

Pumpkin Cake with Maple Cream Cheese Frosting

For the cake:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar $2 \frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons baking
- 1 ¼ cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups pumpkin puree (not pumpkin pie filling)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 eggs

- 2 cups flour
- 2 ½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 ½ teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt

Pinch of salt

For the frosting:

- 8oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1 stick butter, ½ cup, softened
- 3 cups confectioners'
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon pure maple syrup

sugar

To make the cake:

- » Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9X13 baking pan.
- » In a large bowl whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and salt.
- » In a separate bowl, whisk together sugar, brown sugar and vegetable oil. Add the eggs and vanilla and whisk until well combined. Fold in the pumpkin puree.
- » Stir wet ingredients into the bowl of dry ingredients and whisk until completely combined.
- » Pour batter into prepared pan and bake for 35-40 minutes. It will be done when a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.
- » Cool completely before frosting.

To make the frosting:

- » Using a handheld mixer or stand mixer with a paddle, beat together cream cheese and butter. Add in confectioners sugar, vanilla, maple syrup and salt. Beat on low until sugar is incorporated and then on medium for 2 minutes.
- » Frost cooled cake and enjoy!


