Looking Ahead to Summer 2024

It's hard to believe that summer 2024 will mark my 5th Huckins summer. Each year has been unique, and it's a joy to be a part of this remarkable community! As we look ahead to summer, we have a lot to be excited about. Here is a preview of a few exciting updates for summer 2024.

Staffing

Staff retention is the highest it's been in the last 5 years. We are fully staffed in our cabins, with counselors who were once campers themselves, and who are already counting the days until they meet their campers. Our Divisional Counselors, Department Heads and Program Directors bring years of experience to their roles, and nearly half our international staff team from 2023 are returning. We can't wait to welcome the 2024 staff team to Huckins in June!

We recognize staff are essential to the success of our programs, and we are launching two new initiatives. First, we are actively working to provide meaningful professional



development and internship opportunities through our Huckins network, tailored to the unique demands of working at camp. Stay tuned for more information on how you can support these initiatives. Second, we've established a staff support fund to offer financial assistance to those who may otherwise be unable to afford to return to Huckins. Staff can apply for help with school-related expenses, similar to the camper financial aid process.

The Huckins Experience

Practicing our core values of Caring, Honesty, Respect, and Responsibility will allow our staff and campers to work together to build a community where Huckins' mission comes to life. Each day will be filled with activities to foster laughter, confidence, authentic friendship, independence, and leadership skills. We can't wait to feel the energy and spirit of our 2024 community!

Departments

This summer, we're giving special attention to our Small Crafts department. Our beloved fleet of sailboats has been



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well loved, requiring several boats to be retired. To ensure we continue to fill Broad Bay with Huckins sails, we have purchased 6 new Rocket sailboats. These boats, akin to the classic Sunfish but lighter and more maneuverable, are made in the USA making parts readily accessible to keep them camper ready. Not forgetting about the Hobies, we have plans to purchase a new Hobie so an entire cabin can explore the lake on the Hobie Waves. Additionally, we've added a 2024 Nautique ski boat, so we will have two Nautique ski boats for the water ski program this summer.

Pickleball and tennis enthusiasts will be pleased to see we are repainting and repositioning the pickleball lines, increasing flexibility between tennis and pickleball. The Craft Shop was deeply cleaned and reorganized during the Fall Alumni Weekend, so we are

ready for some serious creativity! The swim lanes will be put to good use by the Huckins swim team, defending our undefeated record at our intercamp swim meets.

Check-In Time Change

Check-in is changing to the morning! Campers will move in between 9:30-12:00 on check-in days, and camp activities will begin with a Chef Joel prepared lunch followed by an afternoon of swim checks, ice breakers, intros, orientation, and sign ups.

Her presence in the kitchen will be sorely missed and certainly never replicated or imitated.

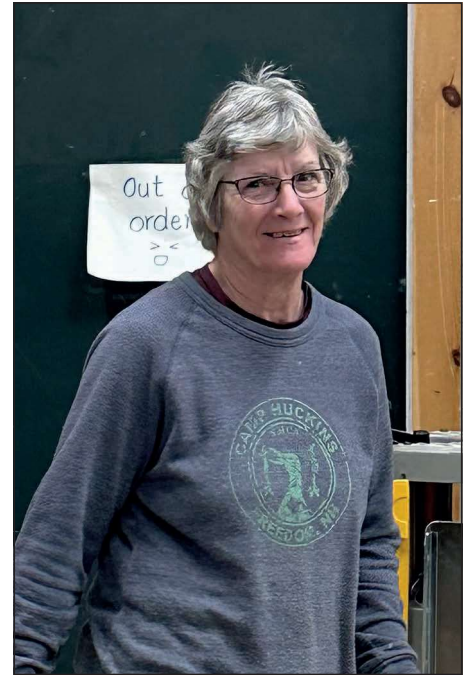
Since I started in 2013, Ginny has been the one constant, 6 days a week, every summer and she truly is irreplaceable. A shining example of that hardy New Englander, her work ethic is legendary. Ginny would think nothing of working 8 hours feeding 500 hungry campers and then go home to put up 100 bales of hay, stack 3 cords of wood, weed her garden and tend to her beloved cows. Cows that have, in turn, nourished eaters at Huckins for a few years now and hay that has nourished our horses for many years.

In my nearly 30 years of working in kitchens, I have never met or had the pleasure of working with someone quite like Ginny. She has always been 10 steps ahead of me and running circles around everyone. I can only think of a handful of times that I beat her to the kitchen for a breakfast shift, and I live here! Ginny has flipped countless pancakes, fried mountains

of eggs, grilled tens of thousands of grilled cheese sandwiches. She owned the flat top griddle and ruled it with an iron albeit benevolent spatula. No one I’ve worked with moves as quickly as her or works as cleanly. The saying goes, “Time to lean, time to clean” and Ginny spent any spare minute making our kitchen shine. People walk into the kitchen and comment about how clean and organized it is, that’s Ginny. When writing prep lists long enough to make the most grizzled kitchen vet gasp, my only thought was, “Is this enough to keep Ginny busy?” Almost always the answer was, “No.” In that proverbial scenario where the ship goes down, I’m looking for Ginny’s lifeboat every time. “What would Ginny do?” has become my personal mantra.

Not only is she the hardest working person I’ve ever known, but she has also always been instantly the most loved by our international staff. Her quiet encouragement, willingness to jump in and rub elbows in the most menial tasks, generosity and sense of humor have made many staff members far from home feel welcomed and at ease. A prankster at heart, Ginny has always kept the staff on their toes, smiling and laughing. Her knowledge and lead by example style consistently gained immediate respect.

Outside of the kitchen, Ginny has spent many hours doing anything and everything to help put camp to bed in the fall and re-open in the spring. She has probably cleaned or painted every square inch of camp. She’s kept an expert eye on the Nature Hut gardens, the chickens and the goats when no one was looking. She knows every fawn and doe that live in these woods, sometimes on a first name basis. Not your stand-on-the-table-and-sing kind of Nellie girl, Ginny has cared for Huckins in a very specific, unique and non-public way.



As I contemplate a summer without her presence in the kitchen, it doesn’t seem possible to fill that space with just one person. Her shoes will never be filled but I will be forever grateful to have worked alongside (or a few steps behind!) her. Thank you, Ginny, for all you have done for camp, for our campers and staff and for me. Our kitchen team will miss you every day.

A RECIPE FROM JOEL'S KITCHEN

Berberere Roasted Chicken with Avocado and Feta Panzanella

Serves 6. Berbere is a traditional spice blend from Ethiopian and Eritrean cuisines. I really enjoy it on chicken or roasted veggies. Not common everywhere but a well-stocked grocery store should have it and it is worth seeking out. Some versions can be spicy so check the heat level if you are sensitive to spicy foods. Tofu could easily be swapped out for the chicken to make this a vegetarian meal. Panzanella is, traditionally, an Italian salad that incorporates stale bread. The extra step of crisping the bread in some olive oil is a must! Enjoy!

Avocado Panzanella Ingredients

8-inch chunk of ciabatta or baguette, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
2 avocados, diced
1/2 cups crumbled feta cheese
1 cup cucumber, peeled, seeded, diced small
3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
Juice of 2 lemons or about 1/4 cup
1/2 jalapeno, thinly sliced, or more to taste
1 tsp fresh thyme leaves
2 tsp fresh chives, chopped
sea salt and black pepper to taste

Roasted Berbere Chicken Ingredients

6 chicken thighs, ideally skin on
3 tablespoons Berbere spice
2 teaspoons sea salt

Steps for Panzanella

1. Combine cucumber, jalapeno and lemon juice in a medium sized bowl and rest for 10 minutes.
2. Stir in olive oil, salt and pepper.
3. Gently fold in avocado, chives, thyme and feta. Adjust Seasonings to taste. Set aside while you cook the chicken and prepare the bread chunks.
4. In a large skillet, over medium heat, warm 3 more tablespoons of olive oil. Add bread chunks and cook stirring occasionally until golden brown and crispy. I like them to be crisp on the outside but still have a little softness on the inside, sort of like a grilled cheese sandwich. Sprinkle with a bit of sea salt and transfer to a bowl or plate.

Steps for Berbere Chicken

1. Pre heat oven to 375 degrees.
2. Place chicken in a large bowl and add Berbere spice and salt. Toss to combine.
3. Heat 2 tablespoons Olive oil in the same skillet you used for the bread over medium-high heat. Place chicken, skin side down in skillet and sear for about 5 minutes or until skin starts to crisp and begins to get nicely browned. Turn chicken and sear on the other side for another 4 minutes. Transfer skillet to oven and cook until the chicken reaches 185-190 degrees. 165 degrees is fine for safe eating, but chicken thighs are much better when cooked a bit longer. All the connective tissue inside turns into juicy goodness at that higher internal temperature.
4. Rest chicken for 10 minutes and then slice.
5. Meanwhile, add the crisped bread to the salad and gently toss to combine everything. Check for seasoning and then divide between 6 shallow bowls. Top with sliced chicken.



What ever happened to...

Laura (Sullivan) Ethridge?



I attended Camp Huckins from 1979 to 1987, starting in Cabin U with Jackie Jepson as a JC, and ending as an SC in Cabin B in 1987.

I learned about Huckins from a Weston friend, Jenna Steere, from her sisters Tammy and Kim, who had learned of camp from the Darien crew of the '70s. Our third-grade spring was filled with plotting for camp life, memorizing camp songs, and practicing to pass the outside area test. As soon as I arrived, I knew my long-term goal was to become Huckins Counselor. At 55, it remains my favorite job, ever.

My second year, I was lucky enough to be an upper junior in Cabin S-U-P-E-R with our beloved Jody Hutchinson Skelton. Jody has remained a shining light for me, a hero in many a school essay or a public speech, a cheerleader always, and a captain of fun, whether I was visiting Huckins as an adult or she was on the road visiting alums. As an adult, one fond memory is arriving on opening day for my niece's lower junior year. The minivan rolled up to check in, and there was Jody. Instantly, she opened the door, jumped in, and escorted Mikie to her first cabin. When we got to the cabin, we bumped into the late great Margie Rosenthal, who had been my CIT SC, with her daughter. It was the perfect start for the next generation of camp life.

Huckins traditions, YMCA lessons in leadership, and the friendships I've

made have carried me through life's highs and lows. At 24, my commitment for service compelled me to join the first class of AmeriCorps in Baltimore, MD, and within months, Lisa Breed, a dear camp friend, was sleeping on my futon applying to join AmeriCorps too. In a circuitous route, after business school, I ended up spending most of my career in financial services as a creative problem solver. Starting at American Express in NYC, I migrated to San Francisco to work at Wells Fargo, and fell in love with a Navy man from Mississippi.



In 2021, we moved to a small Mississippi coastal town called Pass Christian, which I lovingly call "Stars Hollow South" as the Chief Marketing Officer at Hancock Whitney Bank, a regional Gulf Coast bank that covers Texas through Florida. My team knows all about Huckins. It is not uncommon that I share a lesson from Vespers, insist on playlists for just about everything, make my leadership team dance it out when we are frustrated, and address a problem camper with the care I learned at as a counselor. I credit my fast turn creativity to the rainy-day song contest, my coaching style to time as waterskiing instructor, my can do attitude from my CIT training, and my conflict resolution skills from surviving in small space with 14 other girls.

In July '85, our W song was to the tune of "The Facts of Life." We sang, "suddenly you're finding out



that Huckins girls are all around you." I can share with all the younger Huckins girls that will remain true for the rest of your life. I met my college roommate in Cabin J and reunited in the dorm freshman year. Two adult friends sent their girls to Huckins at my recommendation. My nieces attended camp for seven years each. I have reunited with Huckins girls in restaurants, bathroom lines, parking lots, conference rooms and after public speaking engagements.

My Huckins friends have been my ride or die lifeline — from fun weekend reunions on Lake Winnepesaukee, last phone calls before we travel overseas, supporting the last-minute wedding day emergency capers, standing by each other's side when we lose loved ones, and all the goofy texts and calls in between. Huckins stays with you forever.

HUCKINS CAREER INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

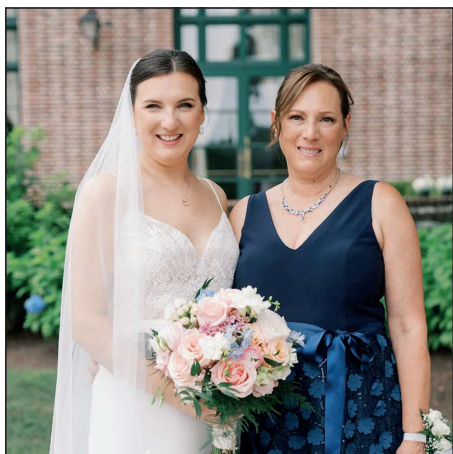
Are you interested in a Huckins staff member coming to intern at your company?

It's a Small World After All

We can all agree that Huckins played an important part in our lives and camp has given us memories that we all fondly look back on. Within the Huckins bubble, we learned new things, gained confidence and independence, and made lifelong memories and friends. We grew and developed under the pines, and we were encouraged to live our lives outside of camp with the same skills and lessons that were instilled in us. We showed the “outside world” what a Huckins person is capable of. Not only did Huckins develop us as people, but it also gave us a global family all connected by the same Huckins spirit.

This widespread connection was on display when Jody Skelton traveled throughout Europe this past summer, visiting Huckins alumni and friends. She, and “Flat Nellie”, traveled to 7 countries and visited 29 people, many of whom were past International Staff members. The alumni that Jody visited came to Huckins to live and work in the States for the summer and participate in a cultural exchange program. Little did they know they would experience a place that would impact their lives and stay with them forever. The International Staff program highlights some of Jody's best memories

when she was Director — she loved watching staff grow and develop from the beginning of staff week through each season and seeing them create lasting memories and friendships.

Now, almost 40 years later since Huckins first began the International Staff program, Jody was on the other side of this opportunity. She experienced her own cultural exchange program during her travels and stayed with friends around the globe. When these young people came to Huckins, they tried new things and immersed themselves in a new place far away from home, with courage and excitement. Now it was Jody's turn. “People were so excited to show off parts of their country, they were so excited for [me] to come to their home, whereas they had been to [my] home many times,” Jody remarked. As she spent time visiting their families, going to their jobs, watching their concerts, and visiting the landmarks around them — she fully immersed herself in their home, traditions, and family. One of the alumni she visited was Ugis Cinis in Latvia. Ugis came to Huckins from 1990

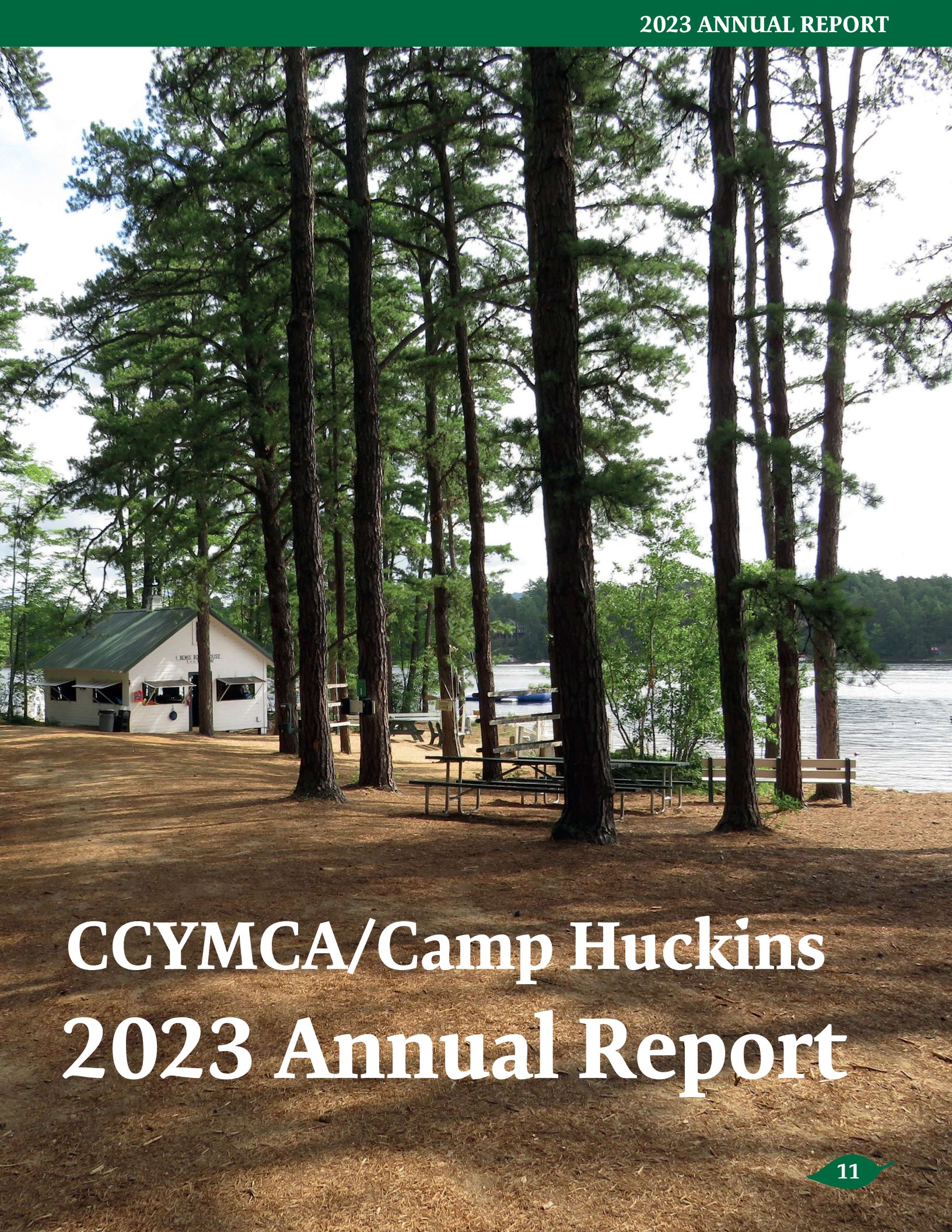

What Jody witnessed during her travels, and what we can all attest to, is the magic of a Huckins friendship and connection. The relationships formed at camp with people you live, work, and play with 24/7 are special and cannot be attained anywhere else. A Letter from the Board Chair

Anne Depew



I love listening to stories that speak to the permanence of the Huckins Experience. This is expressed in ways such as how people feel when they arrive; the breath that catches when they crest the hill to the waterfront; and the sense that washes over them when they walk into the Lodge, a place they regard as hallowed space. The permanence also is expressed in ways related to descriptions of the fun they had at camp; life-long friends; and people of different camp generations meeting as adults and feeling instantly connected. The permanence is palpable when one sees a group of campers playing, laughing and singing; hears a whistle and a yell of “buddy check;” smells the pine trees; hangs a shirt on a gimp hanger; and in so many other ways.

My term as Board Chair coincided with the arrival of COVID and the resulting summers of adjustment. Many of the stories of permanence were almost electric as everyone scrambled to ensure that Huckins would financially weather a summer without campers; that our campers would feel the strength of the Huckins spirit when they and their families desperately needed it; and that our staff would grow and would not be exhausted by the demands they faced. My

term also coincided with the arrival of Heather as our Executive Director. She has patiently and carefully demonstrated the strength of her leadership; the power of her vision; her practice of considering diverse viewpoints and opinions; her faith in and reliance on the talent and expertise of her team; and her openness and kindness. She listened, internalized, and distilled these stories of permanence and has added her own.

Starting mid-last summer, I started hearing things like “Thank goodness Camp now can return to normal” or “I am so happy the last few years are over and we can do things the way we used to.” My sense is that the goal should not be to “go back” and that Huckins should not aspire to “return” to anything. Yes, there were changes made in the past few years, some of which we have been happy to shed. The challenges also gave us the opportunity to collect and reflect upon the stories of permanence and to clearly define what the Huckins Experience is. It is that experience we want to be permanent. We will continue to do what we always have tried to do – allow our campers and those we serve in our community to have a Huckins Experience. That necessarily means that we provide an experience with permanence and one that is ever mindful of the importance of creating that experience today and tomorrow, not yesterday.

Board members, committee members, and volunteers worked tirelessly in 2023 and deserve thanks for sharing countless hours, expertise, and a shared mission to nurture the Huckins Experience. The Board works through its committees to support Heather, Mark, and all members of the year-round staff and to strengthen the organization with strategic insight and the expertise each brings.

The Board added a seat for the chair of the Young Alum Committee a few years ago and Marybeth Sullivan served with distinction as the first Young Alum board member. This seat rotates, and Marybeth stepped off the board at the end of 2023, although she continues her committee work. Liz Sanborn Ventre also stepped off the Board. Liz was the longest-tenured board member and served in almost all board roles, usually with a focus on the financial aspects of the organization. Liz remains on the Finance Committee and she deserves a great deal of thanks for her decades of service and unflinching focus on financial health.

The Board welcomed Audrey James (as the next Young Alum member), Caitlin Mulligan, and Emily Parker at our first meeting in 2024 and we are grateful for their willingness to share their talents. All three have previously served on committees. The Board also elected new officers who will serve for the next three years: Kristen Parthe Brown, Chair; Sarah Day Guzman, Vice Chair; Krista Marschner, Secretary; and Heather Daley Lamberton, Treasurer.

Thank you for your support in 2023, for being part of my Huckins Experience, and for your willingness to continue to make the Huckins Experience available for others. I look forward to hearing more of your stories and to continuing to witness growth, evolution, and permanence.

Huckins' strengths, and legacy of creating transformational experiences, are directly connected to the continued generosity and commitment of our Huckins community. We are grateful to the camp families, staff, volunteers, alumni, community members, campers, and foundations that shared their time, expertise, and financial support. Together we create unique opportunities for girls, women, campers, and families to come together and play. While playing under the pines, we breathe more deeply and freely. The culture of play is the foundation of the Huckins experience, where we discover more about who we are and what we can do. Authentic friendships are formed that will lift us up into adulthood. Confidence and resiliency grow along with mind, body, and spirit. The lessons and skills of a Huckins summer build creative problem solvers and effective leaders, a network of remarkable individuals ready to make a positive impact in our world!

The financial summaries that follow provide an overview of the investments being made to deliver quality, safe programs, the staff experience, capital improvements, and ongoing maintenance. These investments are advancing the organization's strategic priorities and demonstrate our commitment to caring for the organization's resources, building on our strengths as we invest in the future. We began updating the Master Plan this year with that same commitment and an eye toward our centennial.

In 2023, we committed to supporting financial assistance for families through annual donations to the Huckins Fund. Your gifts allowed us to provide over \$350,000 of financial assistance through scholarships, discounts, tiered tuition options, water ski and horseback riding costs, and camp clothing. CCYMCA Camp Huckins is committed to making sure cost is not a barrier to participation in our programs, and your support helps to make that possible.

The 2023 capital improvements enhanced the camp experience, especially the Dining Hall. In addition, the expanded swim lanes created a new waterfront program space for campers and staff to enjoy (and train for our Belknap swim meets). The portable stage and sound system were especially helpful in the Sports Complex for our many rainy day lip syncs and talent shows. On sunny days, the expanded Sportsfield allowed for multiple instructionals and opened new Program Day options.

Thank you for your commitment to CCYMCA Camp Huckins mission, programs, and people. As we look toward the future, we are confident that together we can ensure the generations that follow can experience the simplicity and joy of a Huckins summer.

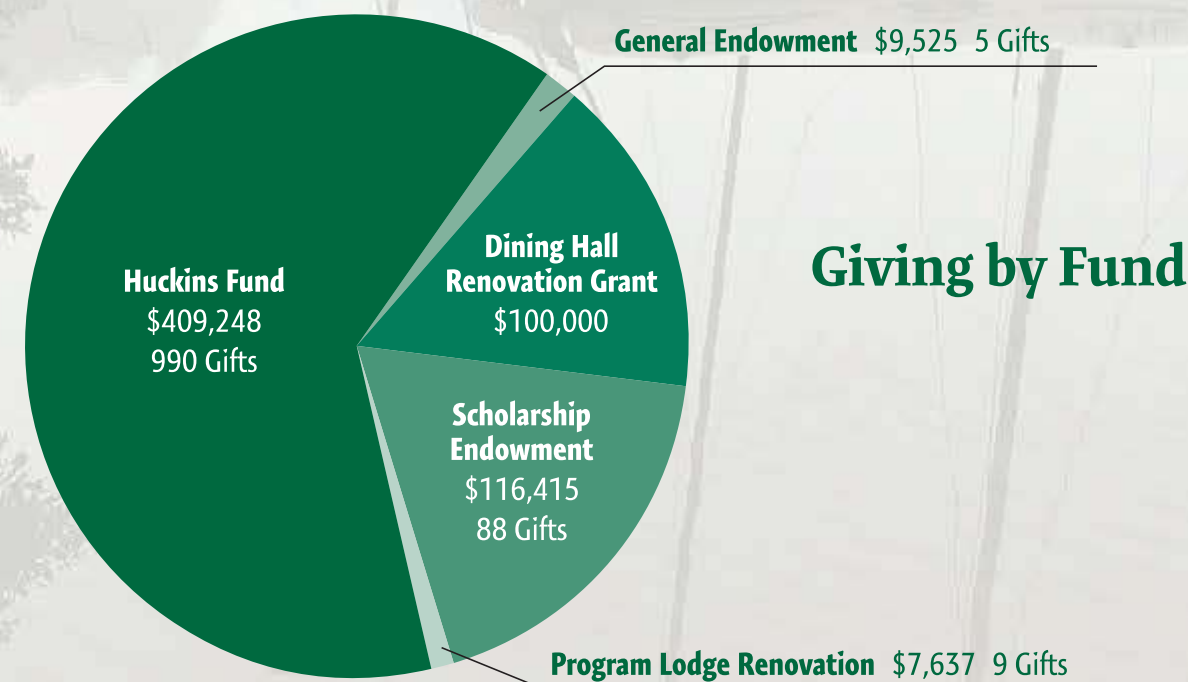

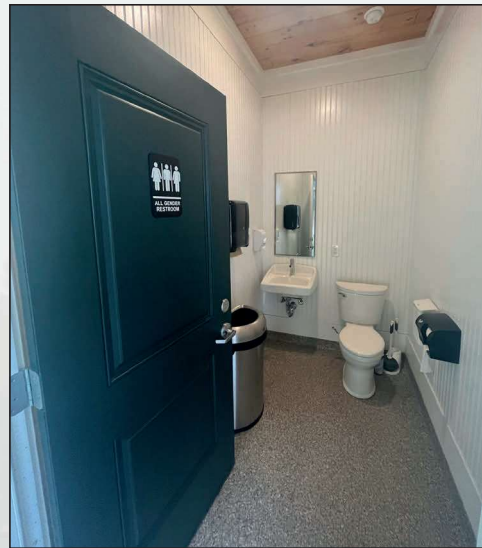

It became clear we needed to eat together in one space *and* that having more space between tables for carts and walking made the dining experience much more positive for everyone! We found that standing and singing is essential, and that we needed more bathrooms and handwashing options. These perspectives guided the plan for our Dining Hall capital project.

In June 2023, our dining hall addition and renovation was completed and ready to welcome hundreds of campers. A 50' extension was constructed on the gable end facing toward the Sport Complex. This extension provides the additional space to spread out and maintain walkways between tables

and buffets. This has made the building much more accessible. The windows were upgraded, and additional lighting was added to blend the existing space and new building. Our bathrooms were completely renovated, transforming two gendered bathrooms into six gender neutral, private bathrooms, including two fully accessible units. The entry way received a makeover, showcasing a selection of our historical archives. Finally, a pergola was added to the front of the dining hall for some extra shade and to soften the exterior view of the building.

On the back of another successful season, we are thrilled with both the functionality of the new space and the aesthetics. Our goal with any upgrade is to envision an updated facility that fits Huckins and that will serve for decades to come. We believe the new Dining Hall does just that. The Dining Hall is an airy, rustic, spacious building, which has enhanced the dining experience for our community. And as we all know, a Huckins Dining Experience matters.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS SNAPSHOT

Squeaky Sneakers: A program for children aged 18 months-3 years and their caregivers, focused on motor skill development, coordination & socialization skills, and learning through play and creativity. Over 25 families attended programs offered in North Conway throughout the year.

New Hampshire Youth & Government: 35 students from Kingswood Regional High School and Moultonborough Academy participated in this mock legislative program held in the New Hampshire State House.

Teambuilding for Local Schools: Facilitated over 380 local children from 3 different schools from across the County with teambuilding, low ropes, and camp activities. These programs are held at Camp and are designed to support the beginning of the academic year.

Freedom After School Program: Provided over 5,900 hours of programming to students from January -June. The final session was held exclusively at Camp Huckins, allowing students to use the facility and participate in camp activities!

Freedom Village Store: Donated the venue for the Store's annual fundraising auction, held in August at the Camp Huckins Dining Hall.

Food Pantry Donations: Camp families, pre & post season groups, and staff donated over 2,200 non-perishable food items over the course of the summer. These items were donated to local food pantries serving our community.

Eastern Slope Ski Club (ESSC): 64 hours of staff time was donated last winter to ESSC. This time was spent helping to teach local elementary school children how to downhill ski and at local ski sales helping families pick out appropriate ski gear.

Fun Field Days: Worked with 2 local elementary schools to provide their end of year celebrations at Camp. Over 275 students participated in water activities, sportsfield games, ropes course, fishing, pontoon boat rides, and more!
